In other words, Natik is a home with a garden where hope can live and flourish. You are part of an eclectic clan of idealists, visionaries, and leaders that has banded together with our charm of hummingbirds. We all know that collaboration makes our structures stronger and our gardens more productive.

Natik's mission focuses on Education, Health, and Sustainable Livelihoods because we believe everyone has a right to live informed, healthy, and dignified lives. Our partners are eager to expand on their basic organizational skills so they can continue developing their own culturally sustainable strategies and structures.

Your investment in the creation of locally-based infrastructures means that our charm of hummingbirds can confront the Goliath of exclusion and violence that has dominated these regions for many generations. Natik is small, but we are agile and maximize our potential for regional impact by pollinating collective knowledge construction. A MESSAGE FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

This report was created by our team with love and appreciation for the central role that you play in everything we do. Your trust allows us to commit to a steep experiential learning curve based on implement-learn-evaluate-adjust for every strategy, structure, and process. Your loyal generosity increased regional impact through education, health, and sustainable livelihoods for children, women, and families.

The past year was spent evaluating and visualizing our strategies for the next phase of our organizational planning. We completed one Strategic Plan and set up the next. We realized that collective knowledge construction is crucial for breaking through generational patterns of exclusion, poverty, illiteracy, and violence. Together, we can understand the root causes and develop effective solutions. We are committed to leveraging this potential and refining our strategies to make a meaningful impact in the communities we serve.

The traditional indigenous culture inclines toward collective benefit, or win-win. However, that diminishes as students progress through the more competitive win-lose paradigm of formal education. Higher levels of education often results in going somewhere else to live and work.

By contrast, the leadership of our partner organizations invests their education into building alternative infrastructures that benefit their communities. Their willingness to share their privilege with others means they are always eager to learn whatever is needed to operate more effectively and increase impact. As each person strengthens their capacity to serve their communities, their potential benefit to other leaders increases.

Knowing you were there gave our charm of hummingbirds the courage to keep flying despite the health, economic, social, political, and environmental storms of recent years. We all benefited from our growing network of donors, advisors, and professional volunteers.

We strengthened our partner relationships and our partners reinforced their community impact. Local impact continued during the recent challenges because each partner is rooted in its own community history and social norms. Their cultural sustainability is intrinsic from vision to implementation, so the adaptations were practical and brilliant.

Over the past five years, we added 'health' to our mission statement, integrated three team members, and assimilated two new partners in Santiago (ANADESA and Pueblo a Pueblo). We are now considering another partner in Chiapas through our Seed Grant initiative.

Natik's partner organizations are led by millennials and younger. Their determination to be agents of change in their communities motivates us to help them find ways to share their work directly with the world. In 2021 we began pairing partners with volunteers who help identify stories and edit texts for the monthly bulletins. In 2022, we were invited to join DonorSee, a fundraising platform created by and for millennials (and younger), who are also determined to be agents of change in the world. The donations are small but numerous, giving our partners opportunities to tell their stories and establish name recognition with new audiences.

The economic challenges of the past few years motivated Natik and our partners to double down on our pursuit of mission-based incomes from products and services. We learned that long-term financial sustainability for all must not depend entirely on donations and grants. Stronger partners means less dependency on Natik.



LOOKING BACK AT THE LAST 5 YEARS

OUR VISION OF SUCCESS

Long-term impact requires relationships based on trust.

At Natick, we firmly believe that by establishing direct, long-term partnerships with organizations focused on improving education, health, and sustainable livelihoods in their communities, we can significantly contribute to the success of local solutions and sustainable improvements in these key areas.

We recognize that grassroots organizations already possess visionary leadership and ideas about what can work locally to confront the challenges of poverty and marginalization in their communities.

Smaller organizations often lack access to funding sources for general operating costs or the support that allows them to develop their visions and grow stronger. In many cases, the organizations we partner with are learning to establish formal structures that both challenge and respect local culture in ways that make sense to them. They need platforms that give voice to their successes and lessons learned.

As the general public develops a deeper understanding of community challenges, they are better prepared to collaborate in meaningful ways.

Through close collaboration with our partners, Natick creates spaces for reciprocal learning and substantive change.

Solutions are not one-size-fits-all, so our partnerships are personalized to provide the support each organization has prioritized. Support can take various forms, including:

Operational and program grants.

Access to fundraising platforms, donor management, and communications training.

Organizational support in areas such as grant writing, planning and project development, and financial planning.

Access to volunteers and professional development opportunities.

Strategies to promote knowledge sharing with other community initiatives.

Actions to increase our partners' agency and voice: within Natick, in their communities, and through global alliances.

Integration of insights from evaluations into partner strategies.



OUR PARTNERS' STORIES

Natik helps grassroots organizations to transform the future of their communities through education, health, and sustainable livelihoods.



ANADESA – Partner Grant \$16,596

ANADESA works in Santiago Atitlán, where more than 96% of the indigenous population speaks Maya Tz'utujil. Men and women generate local incomes via handicrafts, fishing, agriculture, and commerce. Children help their parents earn enough money to survive. Some have the possibility of studying, but most do not.

ANADESA's programs target sustainable community development through education, leadership, and economic development programs for children, youth, and women in Santiago Atitlán, Sololá, Guatemala. As part of their economic training, ANADESA subsidizes their programs through volunteer and tourist services and artisan sales.

"If I didn't receive support from ANADESA, my parents and I would have to work more than we do now to be able to make money to buy my school supplies." Pedro, Second Grade.

"The previous years were more difficult, but we did not give up. We fought until we got to where we are now. Everything we have achieved has been thanks to the people who support us and encourage us whether they are near or far away". María Cristal, Vice President.





Pueblo a Pueblo – Partner Grant \$39,411

Pueblo a Pueblo contributes to the eradication of poverty in rural communities in and around Santiago Atitlán, Sololá, Guatemala. They provide scholarships, operate a youth entrepreneurial leadership program, and support and educate women on nutrition and wellbeing during pregnancy. The agricultural and beekeeping projects teach skills that provide nutrition and locally-based income for families.

“I do whatever I can to help my husband earn income since I dread the idea of him having to migrate, leaving me and our two children alone. I love the Mother-Infant Health sessions since my mother died of emphysema from cooking over open fires her whole life. I recently started my own backyard garden so my family will have fresh organic greens to complement our beans and tortillas.” Mariela, participant in the Mother-Infant Health Program.”

“I am 20 years old and I only completed third grade. The good thing is that every day we learn new techniques on how to work and carry out projects. This year I learned how to organize a group. The leadership training helps me be involved in the projects and has helped me to collaborate with my companions.”

Puerta Abierta Traveling Library – Partner Grant \$4,031

The Traveling Library Program of the Puerta Abierta School in Santiago Atitlán, Sololá, Guatemala reaches children, youth, grandparents, and families. Through books they connect with communities while exploring diverse themes that foster leadership, critical thinking, empathy, inclusion, and literacy.

Their Open Books program accompanied more than 30 teachers from different schools, organizations, and libraries working with groups of children throughout Guatemala. They worked with teachers to practice storytelling techniques, with guidance for the storytime program, including the importance of book selection, preparing questions, and connecting activities that can be done as part of interactive literacy sessions.

“Children enjoy reading in nature and I know how meaningful it is for everyone to have access to books and stories to share under a tree. There I feel free to imagine, speak, and create. Reading in nature is a gift!”

*“Everyone loves Book Celebration Week. We created books out of recycled materials, had a concert of songs and music based on the book *The Monster of the Lagoon*, shared tongue twisters, read stories, and broadcast a puppet show via Facebook.”* Isaías, Traveling Librarian.





Ruk'ux – Partner Grant \$12,158

In 2007 Ruk'ux began as a scholarship and tutoring program in Santiago Atitlán, Sololá, Guatemala. Since then it has added leadership and entrepreneurial training. Every year, ten exceptional students are challenged socially and academically as they improve reading and writing skills and contribute to the community through volunteer service. Older students tutor the younger students, creating a community of mutual support. They are the first in their families to attain higher levels of education, which comes with a very particular set of social challenges.

“According to the story my relatives told about education in the past, women were the ones who did the housework, while men were sent to school. But even the boys often had to leave school at an early age to contribute to the families’ financial survival. That’s why the scholarship program is so important, and why most of our scholarship students are women!” Dolores, Coordinator Ruk'ux Scholarship Program

“Fortunately, the treatment of women in the community is no longer as it used to be. There are still cases where women are mistreated, but now there are laws that protect women’s rights. Today we see women occupying important positions.” Dayana, Ruk'ux High School Scholarship Student.



Mujeres Sembrando la Vida – Partner Grant \$5,618

Mujeres Sembrando la Vida Artisan Cooperative in Zinacantán, Chiapas, Mexico has been innovating new designs since 2000. They are inspired by ancestral traditions and influenced by modern culture. MSV values the quality of each product. Everyone contributes ideas to develop the themes provided by their clients. One artisan is selected to test the product design on her backstrap loom and trains other artisans to replicate it. She is then responsible for assuring the quality of that product.

When a cooperative member has corn or beans for sale, the members buy them or promote their sale locally and support each other as individuals, as a group, and as a community. Out of their profits as a collective, the artisans set aside 5% for their emergency fund and donate 5% to the Yo'nik Learning Center.

“We will always continue to work with the intention of providing livelihoods so our members can support their families.” Yoli, MSV Coordinator and Designer

“We plant and take care of fruit trees in the communities for our own benefit. We also build wood-saving stoves so we do not have to breathe smoke. Our name is Women Sowing Life because we take care of our cooperative and our communities by sowing life.” Collective statement of the MSV Artisan Cooperative.





Yo'onik Learning Center – Partner Grant \$10,500

The Yo'onik scholarship and tutoring program helps improve students' grades at school and develops important social and leadership skills in Zinacantán, Chiapas, Mexico. They cultivate vegetable gardens, learn about recycling, and participate in reforestation efforts. Yo'onik integrates the local traditional culture into their educational program and motivates children and adolescents to continue their studies. The participants do well in school and when they grow up they'll harvest the fruit and lumber from the trees they planted in their youth and pass along the wisdom of respecting the land and taking care of the environment to their children.

“Grandmother Maria did not have the opportunity to study and she went every day to the mountains to shepherd her sheep and cultivate the land. One day she said, “If you have that dream and the desire to work, I will give you my cornfield to construct the Yo'onik house to gather the children.’ Her heart opened to donate her land, despite knowing that it generated an income for her.” Xunka, Co-Coordinator of the Yo'onik Learning Center.

“Starting my university studies was really hard. I didn't believe I would get such good grades, but I feel so happy now!” Vicky, University Scholarship Student.




At'el Antsetik – Seed Fund Grant \$2,500

At'el Antsetik is operated by and for domestic workers, most of whom were originally from indigenous Mayan communities in and around San Cristóbal de Las Casas, Chiapas, Mexico. This collective of women gather on Sundays for classes in literacy and legal rights. The members participate in workshops on community health, healthy cooking, and home gardening.

Natik's Seed Grant in 2022 allowed them to buy a small plot of land, cultivate a vegetable and herb garden, and construct a community kitchen where they learned new recipes and prepared products for local markets. These skills benefit the women and their families, add value to their services as domestic workers, and help subsidize their initiative through sales.

“In April we gathered for seasonal planting. That day we reflected about our knowledge as women and the connection with the earth, as well as the importance of reconnecting with it, through planting and care of the corn, beans, squash and broad beans that were planted that day. First we asked permission from the four pillars of life to guide us and have an abundant harvest. We organized to mix the soil and make furrows to plant our milpa”. Through being the change we hope to see in the world, we believe it's possible to shift from top-down hierarchies toward a recognition of the wisdom of championing local solutions to universal issues. With "Small is Beautiful" as our inspiration, we'll strengthen our ties to the global community, academic institutions, and our donors, through diverse forms of communication.

We'll be intensifying our efforts to motivate support for the unique brilliance of local initiatives, which we believe will contribute to a public better prepared to respond to the needs of poverty, illiteracy, and social exclusion everywhere.

Natic's success is founded in being a sustainable, resilient organization that is consistent with our principles and vision. We continue with our dedication to strengthening our financial sustainability and increasing the professionalization of our team, board of directors, advisors, and volunteers. Additionally, we'll be reinforcing our monitoring and evaluation since both are fundamental to the evolution of our policies and actions.


